





Happy Holidays & Celebrate Students and Staff

As 2014 comes to a close and each of us attempts to balance the demands of family, work, and celebrate the holidays, it is easy to become a bit overwhelmed. It is also at this time of the year that it seems appropriate to reflect on the past year and thereby take the time to acknowledge some accomplishments as well as some of the efforts by staff and students to make a difference for others. The United States educational system is the envy of most nations in the world.

In November the Independence School District was recognized by the Department of Public Instruction (DPI) for exceeding the target expectations for improvement by students with Limited English Proficiency. For 2013-14 Forty-One (41) percent of our students were expected to improve in Reading. In that year For-Seven (47)percent ty improved. Congratulations to Holly Knutson, ELL coordinator and all staff for the hard work they do to help every student every day. It takes a very specific set of skills to help students learning a second language. Our staffs, with Holly's guidance, were willing to study those strategies and do what it takes to help our growing number of Spanish speaking students.

At the start of the 2103-14 school twenty-six (26) percent of our students in grades Kindergarten through 5th grade were reading at or above their grade level. At the start of the 2014-15 school year fifty-One (51) percent of this year's Kindergarten through 5th grade students were reading at or above grade level. Thank you classroom teachers, and Reading Specialist Tim Foslin for all of your hard work in making a difference for all of our students.

In July 2014 the Board of Education authorized the district to purchase a laptop computer for every Middle School and High School Student. These have greatly increased our student

and staff access to enhanced curriculum and improved knowledge. Thank you to the board of education for having the foresight and vision to keep our students and staff up to date in the area of technology.

In October the Sp. Ed department completed the mandatory Department of Public Instruction's self-assessment, which includes selected requirements of IDEA 2004 and state law, which are closely related to improving student outcomes. Twenty randomly selected Individual Education Plans (IEPs) and evaluations were reviewed and found to be in compliant with all federal and state laws. Thanks to the special education staff and Wendy Stuttgen for ensuring that our students receive education plans in compliance with special education requirements intended to help those students reach their potential.

In the Middle School/High School there has been a significant reduction in the student discipline issue for the first three months of this year as compared to the first three months of the 2013-14 school year. This year discipline referrals are down by almost 200 referrals as compared to last year. Congratulations to the Middle School and High School staff and Mr. Schmitt for their commitment to maintaining high expectations.

I continue to be impressed by our students and their many accomplishments. We are blessed with many caring students and staff. There is little doubt, 2015 and the years ahead will be filled with many challenges. However, it is my sincere belief we have much to be thankful for. At this time, I hope each of you will take time to appreciate the positive accomplishments of the past

year. May 2015 be a year of joy, peace, good health, and prosperity for each of you. Principal News Page 4

Mapping Curriculum for Success

The last few years at Independence have been a time of progressive change in the School District. Most notably was the change in the schedule from the block schedule to the current 7-period schedule with an advisory time at the beginning of the day and an intervention/enrichment block at the end of the day. This year the most notable change was the distribution of laptop computers to all of our 6-12 students. The culture of a professional learning community and time devoted to collaboration among peers has also been a significant philosophical change.

There are four questions that schools in a professional learning community ask when they begin their transformation. The first is "What do we want our students to know?" The next three are "How will we know they know it?", "What do we do if they don't?", and "What do we do if they do?"


Last year we spent a great deal of time discussing and answering the first question. Although these questions are simple enough, much time and energy by educators across the district, state, and nation has gone into answering this question. The Common Core State Standards in Reading/Language Arts and Mathematics is an example of an answer to the question. Our District used these standards to develop our "Power" Standards in Reading Language Arts and Mathematics, but the other subject areas weren't so lucky to have such a They needed to develop their resource. "Power" Standards from either State or National standards that have been used or from professional organizations in the field of education. Our teachers used guidelines to rate content standards into three categories, "Need to Know", "Important to Know", and "Nice to Know". The "Need to Know" standards were those that we felt were absolutely essential for our students to be college and career ready. "Important to Know" are those that would be beneficial for most of the students as they progress in their education and "Nice to Know"

were standards that would be covered when the higher priority standards were mastered.

The process to organize these standards is called "mapping". To make these "maps" as efficient and useful as possible the district purchased a license to a software product called Mastery Connect. This software not only allows teachers to house their standards, but also has "trackers" to help teachers assess if the standards have been mastered. This assists in the second question, "How will we know they know it?" In addition to those tools the software also allows our teachers to network and share knowledge and assessments with teachers from all over the nation using an interface that would be similar to Facebook. It's a great tool and our next step is to eventually allow parental access to some of the information currently stored with this software.

All in all it is a very exciting time for our District. The tools and philosophy we are using are definitely a shift in some traditional methods, but our methodology is based on research and data. This change is sometimes hard to accept, but is essential to give our students the best opportunity to learn and compute in our modern world. It is an essential step into making us the "Best School Ever".

Public School Open Enrollment

The Open Enrollment Application Season for the 2015-16 School Year is February 2, 2015 - April 30, 2015.

What is Open Enrollment?

The inter-district public school open enrollment program allows parents to apply for their children to attend public school in a school district other than the one in which they reside.

Who can apply?

Any Wisconsin resident in five-year-old kindergarten to grade 12 may apply to attend a nonresident school district under the open enrollment program. However, a child may transfer to a nonresident school district for early childhood education or four-year-old kindergarten only if the child's resident school district offers the same type of program and only if the child is eligible for that program in the resident school district.

When can parents apply?

The regular open enrollment application period for the 2015-16 school year begins on February 2, 2015, and ends at 4:00 pm on April 30, 2015. The best way to apply is online (a link to the online application is at the top of this page during the application period).

An alternative application procedure allows pupils to apply for open enrollment at any time during a <u>school year if certain criteria are met.</u>

Can applications be denied?

Both the nonresident and resident school districts may deny an application for reasons specified in state law. If an application is denied by either the resident or nonresident school district, the parent may file an appeal with the DPI within 30 days. The DPI is required to affirm the school district's decision unless the DPI determines that the decision was arbitrary or unreasonable.

How do students get to school?

Parents are responsible to provide transportation to and from school in the nonresident school district, except that transportation required in a child's IEP must be provided by the nonresident school district. A nonresident or resident school district is permitted (but not required) to provide transportation to open enrolled pupils, however the nonresident school district is prohibited from picking up or dropping off a pupil within the boundaries of the pupil's resident school district unless the resident school district agrees. Low-income parents may apply to the DPI for reimbursement of a portion of their transportation costs.



National Honor Society



In the fall of each school year the Independence National Honor Society chapter selects its' new members for the current school year. The students who are eligible based on grade point average of 10.0 receive a letter inviting them to apply to become a member of the Independence National Honor Society for the current school year. In order to apply the students need to complete an application form that is based upon the following aspects "Scholarship, Leadership, Character, and Service," which are the main pillars of the National Honor Society. What Do I Need to Know About the Common Core?

What do I need to know about the Common Core?

There is much information; some myth, some fact, some negative, some positive about the Common Core State Standards. We hope that our parents and community members will take the time to truly understand the CCSS. In the next several newsletters we will share with you some key main points taken from achievethecore.org. As always, we welcome your questions and feedback on this and all aspects of your child's education.

By the 1990's, most states had a set of standards that determined what students should know and be able to do at each grade level, but they were different for each state. This meant that children in one state were

learning different things at different times (and in different years) than children in another. When students came into classrooms from another state, we had to spend a lot of time finding out what they knew or didn't know. Between states, teachers would find a year or more difference in student expectations.

Additionally, the standards that were in place in each of the states were really long lists that typically kept getting longer with every new version. So, even though there was the idea that standards could bring consistency to what was being taught within a state, there were far too many expectations in each subject in each grade to realistically expect teachers to cover the material. Teachers were forced to make decisions each year about which standards to include and not include, leading to even more inconsistencies.

In 2007, governors and chief state school officers decided that the educational standards in their states needed to be updated to reflect new information about what it means to be college and career ready. They agreed that there should be shared standards from kindergarten to twelfth grade.

The goal of these shared standards is to make sure students are well prepared to compete internationally (the USA is currently ranked 30th in the world in math and 20th, in reading, according to the Program for International Student Assessment test results comparing students from 65 countries). The old standards were often a collection of unrelated concepts that did not tie together from year to year, and students were left without crucial connections between previous concepts and new ones. Teachers had to cover too many topics each year without being able to teach them in depth. Also, the standards typically saw 12th grade as the end point, rather than thinking about how to build a K-12 system that supports college and career expectations. The new standards, in contrast are connected from grade to grade and they hone in on specific areas for each

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grade level, allowing children to truly master concepts before moving on.

We will continue to try and meet the needs of every student every day. Stay tuned in upcoming newsletters and the district website for more specifics on the common core. Wisconsin Technology Initiative Grant



This past month the School District of Independence applied for the Wisconsin Technology Initiative Grant. This grant provides funding to K-12 schools to advance

the use of technology in learning environments throughout the state of Wisconsin. We have applied for this grant to provide consistency with the technology in all of our classrooms. With this grant we would be able to purchase and install 15 new SMARTboards and projectors as well as

purchase 10 SMART document cameras. A SMARTboard is an interactive whiteboard that uses touch recognition for user input. These boards and the software that comes with them allow



teachers to create lessons that engage our students by getting them out of their desk to manipulate objects on the board, providing a hands- on experience. With the SMART document camera teachers will be able to easily capture images, video and audio. The document cameras transform complex lessons and abstract concepts into a hands-on learning environment. If awarded this grant the district will receive \$50,000.00 to purchase both the SMARTboards and document cameras. We will hopefully be notified this month if our grant application was accepted and approved.

District Exceeds State and Federal Goals on Increases for ELL Students

The Independence Public Schools have recently received word that the district has exceeded state and federal targets for achievement among Limited English Proficient (LEP) students for 2013-2014. Each year state and federal education laws hold districts accountable for the outcomes of LEP students, known as English Language Learners (ELLs). ELL students take a state-mandated English proficiency assessment, the ACCESS test, every winter in the areas of reading, writing, speaking, and listening. ELL students receive a score in those four areas, as well as in oral language, literacy, and an overall composite score. The overall ACCESS composite score factors into Annual Measurable Achievement Objectives (AMAOs), which hold districts accountable for progress in English language acquisition among its LEP students.

For the 2013-2014 school year the AMAO goal required that 41% of ELLs would gain 0.4 or more in their composite English Language Proficiency (ELP) level score. The DPI data report shows that 47.2% of ELL students gained 0.4 or more on their composite ELP level score, which exceeded the state and federal goals! This means that not only has the district exceeded expected targets, but that more and more ELL students are progressing in their English language acquisition and are reaching English language proficiency comparable to native English speakers. Let's keep up the great work!
