

# From the Desk of Mr. Schmitt CO-OP Update

It has been awhile since I have written about the status of the Trempealeau Valley Co-op 2.0



(TVC 2.0). If you are not familiar with TVC 2.0, it is essentially a rebirth of the model that was part of the local educational system from the 1980's through the early 2000's. Currently only Independence, Arcadia, Whitehall, and Blair-Taylor are part of TVC 2.0. It's

mission is "We will be a world-class collaborative educational system in a rural setting." What this essentially means is we want to give all students in this region the opportunities of a large high school, but keep the small school environment and atmosphere.

As with any new organization, or change to an existing one, there are growing pains. The initial purpose of the co-op was to give the students in the schools opportunities to take classes that may be unavailable on their campus, but available on another. For example, the Family Consumer Education program was cut in Independence many years ago, but it is still available at Whitehall and the other Districts in the co-op. In exchange, Independence is the only school in the co-op that offers a Machining course and an International Business course. This coordination between the schools allows students to have much more choice in scheduling classes and many more opportunities to take courses they are interested in. It also addresses the teacher shortage in many subject areas such as technical education.

The TVC 2.0 formed a Governing Board about one and a half years ago which is composed of two School Board members from each District. In addition to the Mission, the Governing Board has a list of seven Key Components to help direct its Mission. One of them is, "Regional stability and growth must become the primary perspective as we plan at all levels

inside our schools and communities coupled with recruiting and retaining staff and using all resources in the most cost-effective way." The interpretation of this component is that schools must be in tune with the local economy and local labor market projections to help sustain and grow the businesses and industry in the area. This will then also sustain the quality of our schools and the number of students attending them. Employment opportunities and quality schools work hand-in-hand in maintaining a vibrant local economy. This is why the Districts in TVC 2.0 are currently meeting with representatives of local business and industry to gather perspectives on their future employment needs. The Districts are also studying data on labor market projections for Trempealeau County and the region. All of this research is a basis for the Districts to develop career pathways and curriculums to meet the needs of the area and of the global marketplace. It may be surprising for some, but the reality is that many of our largest employers in this area not only do business locally, but also nationally and all over the world. A common phrase within the co-op is "It is our job to prepare students to go anywhere in the world, it's industry's job to keep them here."

Although the co-op model has been used before, this co-op is definitely dealing with a different society than before. Information and technology is growing at an exponential rate, and it is not only necessary to educate our students for the opportunities currently available, but we must also emphasis the ability for them to learn and adapt, as many of the jobs they will perform in the future aren't currently created. Although this is an exciting time it is also challenging. As the old cliché goes, "Two heads are better than one", I then hypothesize that four "heads" are much better than one or two. This is the whole premise behind our cooperation.

As I reflect upon another year in the Independence School District, I value the relation-



ships I've built with students, staff and families. By working together we are truly making some wonderful things happen for our students. Our staff continues to amaze with their efforts and focus on creating the best learning experience for each student. As

a district, we may not always see great success right away, but our trajectory is pointing up as we are continuously improving with each day. We are ready for lift off!

The summer months are fast approaching. This is building a sense of urgency within our staff. Instead of a mindset of shutting down and getting ready for the summer break, our staff continue to challenge students with teaching of the power standards. Teachers want to make sure they are exposing each student to the standards they have identified as power standards before moving them onto the next grade level. It may not sound urgent for someone outside of a classroom, but it is a bia deal to us. It is like taking a blueprint and seeing if the plan actually worked. This will be our second full year using our standard-based report card. When this year does come to a conclusion, we will analyze our student data and determine if the blueprint was followed, or if an adjustment is needed before the start of next school year. We do all of this to increase the rigor of our programming which will give each student the best opportunity to succeed beyond our school walls. There is great power having a common vision across our district that we can all aspire to attain.

We need to be proud of the great work that is happening. Our students are earning higher marks in the eye of our state. At the elementary level, we are seeing a closure of our achievement gap when comparing different subgroups of students. Our elementary has been identified as a top school in the state in this area. We have recently earned a Title I Award for "Beating the Odds." This accomplishment is identified by the success our students have had on the state test (Forward Exam). Although we are seeing incremental success, we recognize there is still room for improvement. The arrow is pointing in the right direction and we hope to build capacity at each grade level so the knowledge of our entire district continues to grow. That is why efforts of teaching to the standard(s) and student learning is so important at every grade level.

Summer is fast approaching and soon our children will be out of our school walls and into the walls of our community. Although we would like as many students as possible to attend our summer programming, we know our students will be visiting the library, beaches, playgrounds, and even JoJo's Drive-In. When you see them around town, tell them you are proud of what you are hearing about your school. Tell them they matter and are important to their own success and the success of the district. Ask them about their day. Ask them what they are reading this summer. Even though we are small, we come together to do some amazing things. We would not be as successful without the support of our community. Be proud of your school district, we are ready to take flight! Thank you for being a positive, active community member for our children!

### End of the Year Device Check In Families of Independence Students Grades 6-12



### TO: Families of Independence Students Grades 6-12

We would like to acknowledge students for taking exceptional care of the laptops again this year. The District leases these devices from Apple, and in the summer District Technology Staff will be going over the laptops to make upgrades to the software and your laptop will be reimaged. As a result, students will be "checking" the laptops back in prior to the end of the school year. Below is a summary of the process.

All students in grade 6-11 will be returning their laptop to school for Summer Check In on June 6, 2019. Seniors will be checking in their device on May 23, 2019.

Prior to May 23, 2019 (for Seniors), all students should make sure any files saved to Documents or on the Desktop are moved to Google Drive and that you have Synced Google Drive. Anything not saved to Google Drive will be erased when we reimage the laptop. Please see Mrs. Pientok or Mr. Xiong if you need assistance with moving your files. You can also use a Google Service called Google TakeOut to move all of your documents and files to a zip drive to store on a separate flashdrive or external hard drive. All seniors will have access to their Independence Google account for up to 1 year after their graduation.

On May 23, 2019 and June 6, 2019, each laptop will be collected and checked in by the student to Mrs. Pientok and Mr. Xiong. Students will be called from class by grade level to bring their laptop, case, and charger to the Cafetorium or other designated areas. This allows the tech staff to look over the laptop and accessories to determine if there is any damage and/or if the student will be charged a fee associated with any damage that is found.

Damage resulting from negligence will be a charge of at least 40% of the cost for a first offense. Students should be reporting any damages on their laptop as soon as they occur so that our staff can determine if the damage is a result of negligence and determine whether or not a fee will be assessed.

When students check in their laptop, they will need the following:

- Macbook Air
- Case
- Macbook Charger, Extension Cord and Duck Head

If the student does not return the Apple approved charger at the time of check-in, they will have until the end of the last day of school to check it in or will they be charged in full for the Macbook charger. **Cost of a charger** is \$80.00.

Students, if you are using a charger that is not Apple approved you are at risk at causing damages to your laptop. Any damage that may occur as a result of using a charger that is not Apple approved will be determined as negligence and you will be charged a fee as stated in the Digital Learning Plan.

During the check in time the Technology staff will be looking for the following things:

- Dents and Dropped Damage
- Missing or Damaged Keys
- Trackpad Issues
- Cracked screen, Pixel Issues
- Case Condition
- Functionality of Device

Any damage that is found on the laptop that results in the laptop not working to optimal functionality and is the result of negligence will be assessed a fee. All fees will need to be paid prior to the start of the 2019-2020 school year or your child will not be able to pick up their laptop at Family Learning Day. In the event of damage caused by negligence (failure to take proper care), the student and parent may be billed a fee according to the following schedule and payment must be in full within 3 months of the billing:

- First incident -- 40% of the cost to repair the device
- Second incident -- 80% of the cost to repair the device
- Third incident -- full cost of repair or replacement of the device

Some examples of damages that have occurred and the cost associated to fix the device include:

- Crack Screen: Replace screen cost \$500
- Dead Pixels: Replace screen cost \$500
- Missing Keys: \$15- \$150
- Damage to Charging Cord: \$80

We would like to thank you again for your support with the laptop 1:1 initiative and for your efforts in keeping the laptops in good care. We look forward to a smooth check-in process that will allow us to keep these laptops in the best possible shape for future educational use. ### Reality Check 2019

Independence Juniors and Seniors participated in UW-Extension's annual Reality Check Event on Thursday, March 21st at Mondovi High School. The event is a simulation of the real-world decisions students will need to make in their mid-20's. Students examined their choices and consequences of decisions related to education, careers, earning, budgeting, borrowing, credit, alcohol and substance use, and child care.

Prior to the event, students worked with UW-Extension to research a career, earnings, educational requirements, educational costs, and benefits that they may encounter as a 25-year-old. Students started the Reality Check event by participating in a mock employment interview. Participants were assigned a wage and a description of their life (married/divorced, number of children, etc). Volunteers at the event helped students understand their paycheck, including taxes and withholdings. Students were then able to open a checking account using their monthly

paycheck, then use blank checks and a register to keep track of their spending. Participants were required to visit a total of 30 different stations to make financial decisions. These stations included housing, credit, human services, insurance, veteran's benefits, automotive, investments, and many more.

Once students visited all of the stations, they worked with an adult volunteer to review their checking account. If they had money left they discussed what could be done with the money on a monthly basis such as saving or investing. If they had a negative balance for the month, they had to go back to some of the stations and adjust their spending habits.

While almost all of the money used during Reality Check was pretend, a few Independence students were awarded real money. Creed Brenner, Nicole Filla, Rebecca Heiden, and Fabian Leon

submitted business plans they created in their Entrepreneurship class, which earned them awards at the event. Congratulations on a job well done!

At the end of the day, students were tired and a

bit overwhelmed; but, the general consensus was that there was a wealth of information to learn and it was a successful event. There were over 130 local volunteers from various businesses and agencies that helped with the day. A special thank you to UW-Extension for planning the event and all of the volunteers that made the day a huge success. We look forward to Reality Check 2020!


### Mardi Gras Carnival Junior PROM 2019


