# Making Democracy Work at the School Level



People who know me well, know that I have never been very concerned about politics. I am not a member of any specific political party since there are platforms of each party that I personally support and certain platforms of each party that I don't. Therefore when I vote, I

don't vote on party line, but vote for candidates that I feel have the best grasp on what is best for their constituents and may not always follow the party line.

As I alluded to in my last newsletter article, this start of this year has been very challenging professionally for me for a number of reasons, but the political climate has been part of it. A number of topics related to school operations have been very politically charged and have forced me to be more aware of politics and how it affects the school's climate and learning environment. Because of this, some of the feedback for decisions I have had to make have been met with some "aggressive" opposition, but despite that, I am not bitter at anyone for their political beliefs or positions. What I am more concerned about is whether I am hearing enough voices or maybe just a few "loud" ones.

The United States prides itself as being the greatest nation in the world and this has been achieved because of a strong democratic process. Part of the process is the election of representatives to serve the people and represent them in making governmental decisions. At the school level, those people are the School Board members. Another part of the process are elections to let the electors determine the fate of proposals that have a significant impact on the electoral district. An example of that at the School District level is a referendum.

As I mentioned earlier, I hear many different viewpoints of issues and topics. What I struggle with is if the perspective is actually the viewpoint of the majority of the stakeholders in the District. There are times people ask me to send out a survey on certain controversial topics. Although I am not against surveys, I struggle with their validity unless I can get a substantial sample size or get a random sample that represents all demographics. At least at school I can control and verify those variables with staff and students, so I use surveys quite often to help my decision making process. That becomes much more difficult with parent or community surveys, because unless we expend a great deal of time making individual contacts, we usually don't get a lot of participation in surveys to families or the community.

To emphasize this even more, I will use the example of last spring's referendum for operating expenses. The referendum failed 129-143 or by 14 votes. It isn't the margin that bothers me so much, but the lack of total votes. We have over 2,400 people living in the District and my best estimate is that about 1,900 are old enough to vote. Now we also may have some residents that are also not eligible to vote due to citizenship, but even if about 1,000 people are eligible to vote, we only had about 25% of the eligible voters cast a ballot on an issue that has a significant effect on the operation of the District. All I know for sure is that 143 people voted against the operating referendum and 129 for it, but I have no idea how many of the approximately 1600 other adults in the District felt about it. The same can be said for School Board member elections. Last spring only a little over 100 ballots were cast.

My point is, for the democratic process to work efficiently, it requires participation by the people. The easiest way to do that in our District is to get to the polls and vote for school board members or on referenda. The other way is to attend Board meetings or participate in surveys when they are sent out. This spring there are two Board seats up for election and there will likely be another referendum for operating expenses. I urge all our eligible voters to participate in these elections so the voice of the people is heard and continues to be heard by the Board members they elect.

Although the past couple of years have generated a lot of political unrest, that also is part of the democratic process. A productive healthy debate should not be avoided, but more importantly, we need to hear the voices of all people. Our current school report card again illustrates the great things our school continues to do and we need the support and participation of our residents to continue striving to be better and truly be the Best School Ever. Please exercise your right to vote and be as active as possible in the decision making process of the school leaders. It is what makes a democracy work.

# Wisconsin State Report Cards Independence Scores Well-Again

One source we use to reflect on our strengths and areas for improvement are the state report cards. The Department of Public Instruction (DPI) creates a District and School(s) Report Card for every publicly funded district and school in the state. These report cards can be accessed online here by families and the general public: <a href="http://dpi.wi.gov/accountability/report-cards">http://dpi.wi.gov/accountability/report-cards</a>.

The Report Cards are intended to help all schools and districts utilize data on specific measures to target improvement efforts and ensure students are ready for the next educational step – including the next grade level, graduation, college, and careers.

The current School Report Card, based on the 2020-2021 school year (and 2 years prior) report in four priority areas:

1. Student Achievement: Proficiency in reading and mathematics on state assessments.

2. **Student Growth:** Measures year-to-year improvements in achievement controlling for circumstances beyond the influence of educators. A high value added score means that, on average, students in the district are progressing more quickly than other similar students across the state.

\*\*Growth is where Independence Shines! Outperforming most districts in the state. We have consistently held strong scores in this area for several years.

3. Target Group Outcomes: Examines outcomes for students with the lowest test scores. It is designed to promote equity by helping districts focus on learners who need the most support while also improving outcomes for all students

4. On-Track to Graduation: Indicates how successfully students are progressing toward completing their K-12 education is a measurement, using reliable predictors, of high school graduation and potential post high school success.

Here are other highlights that we all can be proud of:

#### Middle School



#### FIRST DAY OF INCLEMENT WEATHER

1. There will be no instruction on this day, except for the exception in #2. Neither students or staff need to attend physically or virtually.

High School Students in distance learning classes offered outside the co-op, such as those through UWEC and Western, will run in accordance with their organization's policy. Students are responsible for remote attendance and participation as required.

# SECOND DAY AND AFTER OF INCLEMENT WEATHER

#### Middle/High School Procedures

1. Assignments/expectations for each class will be placed in Google Classroom. They are due at the end of the day following the snow day(s).

2. Teachers will be available to address student needs between 8:00-3:30 via email, Students can email to ask questions or request to meet through classroom links as needed.

3. Teachers report attendance at the end of the day following snow day in accordance with completed assignments. Teachers may want to request students for IPT the day after the snow day who did not complete the assignment. Students who do not complete the assignment are to be recorded as absent.

4. Co-op classes will be held at the discretion of the host school.

Distance learning classes offered outside the co -op, such as those through UW-EC and Western, will run in accordance with their organization's policy. Students are responsible for remote attendance and participation as required.

#### **Elementary School Procedures**

1. Teachers will be available to address parent/student needs between 8:00-3:30 via email.

2. Teachers will send home or email families with instructions for at least a math and reading expectation (ie: complete a recipe at home, count X number of items in your home, read for X number of minutes, etc)

3. These activities are NOT required to be brought back.

#### SCHOOL DELAYS AND CLOSINGS DUE TO INCLEMENT WEATHER School District of Independence 2021-2022

#### ANNOUNCEMENTS WILL BE MADE ON THE FOLLOWING STATIONS:

Student safety is the primary consideration in making a decision relating to school delays or school closings. Normally, one of three decisions is made. The first may be a late start. In this case a two-hour school delay is our standard procedure. The second decision we may make is to close school for the day. The third decision is an early release from school, normally at 1:00pm. Like last year, because we can instruct virtually, when we close to in-person learning for the day, we will still have virtual learning using our daily schedule. Therefore, there really are no "off" days.

We realize that parents have to make childcare arrangements for the day. Therefore, we will try to make school delay or closing decisions the night before, if possible. In the event it's not possible, we will strive to make a decision by 6:00am.
