From the Desk of Mr. Schmitt

TVC 2.0 Update



It's been almost two years since the School Districts of Independence, Arcadia, Blair-Taylor, and Whitehall began talking about cooperating to offer more learning opportunities to the students in the four Districts. The end of the last semester marked the end of the first course offerings for

the cooperative which has been named TVC 2.0 (Trempealeau Valley Cooperative 2.0). The 2.0 signifies the recreation of the cooperative that began in the late 1960's and existed until the early 2000's, that not only involved the four current schools but a number of others also.

As with any new structure, there is going to be growing pains. The current state of the cooperative initiative reminds me of the journey our own school district began several years ago when we committed to being a Professional Learning Community (PLC). Our PLC model is guided by the structure and guidelines of a book written by Richard DuFour, Rebecca DuFour, Robert Eakers, and Thomas Many, titled "Learning By Doing". That title describes not only what the administrators of the schools are following, but also describes what is happening for our students in the classes we are offering through the cooperative.

Through the first semester of this year, we had a number of challenges that had to be dealt with including transportation, attendance reporting, grade reporting, and communication. Despite these challenges we have had positive feedback from the majority of the students that the experience was valuable and enjoyable for them. The Mission Statement of TVC 2.0 is "We will be a world class collaborative educational system in a rural setting." A mission statement can be described as the purpose of the organization. A vision statement on the other hand is what you want to become or do as an organization. The Vision Statement of TVC 2.0 is "Developing career-ready & collegeready students by providing high caliber learning experiences, preparation and pathways in partnership with the greater community to create and maintain regional stability and a greater quality of life for the citizens of central Trempealeau County, Eastern Buffalo County, and Western Jackson County."

In regard to the Mission and Vision statement, I feel TVC 2.0 is off to a great start, but there is still a lot of work to be done. To act as one entity but still maintain four unique school identities is a very complex task and can get contentious and emotional at times. As a small school we worry about our limited resources and being able to make equitable contributions to the cooperative. Larger schools struggle with the need to participate when they are already offering the majority of the courses being offered through the cooperative. Overall though, all parties have been very professional through the process so far and we realize that for the economic viability of the region, we need to cooperate and prepare our students for a global economy. We also realize that we are in a very unique area with a number of global businesses and industry who are in need of more skilled employees.

The support and feedback from our local employers has been tremendous. Because of this, TVC 2.0 has needed to be flexible and fluid. Just recently Ashley Furniture has committed to investing over one million dollars in a Future Skills Trailer that will be a part of the cooperative. The Future Skills Trailer is a mobile laboratory pulled by a semi, which expands into a classroom that is over 900 square feet. This trailer will have learning modules available that are portable and will emphasize lessons in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) as well as other skills needed for future employment. It is designed to have offerings for all students K-12. The commitment of TVC 2.0 is to provide a teacher, a visible site when it is on a school's campus, and the necessary connections for the trailer to operate.

From the Desk of Mr. Schmitt/Vanderloop Scoop

Because of this need to be flexible and fluid, the administrators of the schools have realized that we need to communicate better to the stakeholders of each school and community. A sentence stem, "As of today", has been adopted to not only to communicate what is currently happen, but to also recognize that things may change rapidly depending on circumstances and opportunities that present themselves.

So, "as of today", TVC 2.0 intends to not only offer the same opportunities next year that were available this year, but a number of additions. Besides the Future Skills Trailer, Independence will be offering a Machining course and a course in International Business. Schools will also be opening up courses that may be unique to a particular school, to all students in co-op. Another exciting accomplishment is that all schools have agreed upon a common school calendar and bell schedule. The other schools have also seen the value in a Professional Learning Community and have followed our lead by having an early dismissal on Wednesdays, like we currently have in place. This will aive our teachers not only the opportunity to collaborate with teachers in our own district. but also those in the other TVC 2.0 Districts.

Another big discussion that is currently in its initial stages is the Joint Powers Agreement. As stated earlier, it is a rather complex endeavor, to cooperate as one entity, but still keep separate identities. The Joint Powers Agreement would formalize the "rules" of this cooperation and set the guidelines as to how resources are shared. It will also set a Governing Board made up of representatives from each of the four school boards.

The development of a Joint Powers Agreement will be a watershed moment for TVC 2.0, therefore it is important for us to gather input from stakeholders. Please communicate to Board members and administrators your thoughts on the Mission and Vision of TVC 2.0 and the pros and cons of it. It is important that TVC 2.0 satisfies not only the needs of the region, but also the needs of each district and individual students in those districts.

In conclusion, I would also like to take this opportunity to also offer myself and other district representatives to come to any community organization meetings or citizen groups that you may wish to invite me/us to. I will be contacting some myself to make this offer, but please feel free to reach out to me also. I would love to share what is happening in our school and district.

Promoting a 'Student-First' Mentality

As educators, our job is to maximize the time we have with our students and teach them the necessary skills to open as many future doors as possible. For some

students that door may be an opportunity at the grade, but for others, it is the next chapter in life, post-graduation. Whatever their grade level, each day students will be learning from us and we will be learning from them.

The teachers and staff in the Independence School District are some of the most 'studentfirst' staff I have ever known. I recently had a conversation with a teacher who previously taught at Indee and this teacher can now see the difference in the staff and district mentality towards students learning. Our discussions throughout the day, and especially during collaboration time on Wednesdays, are spent focused on the support we provide for our students, and how we can continue to improve our teaching and their learning. Staff is talking to other staff about student assessment or how to best meet the needs of the students they serve. As students show us things through the data we collect, we are discussing how to best help each one. Students are known by name at Independence and teachers are learning from other teachers as students need to be taught differently to succeed.

This is the power of the collaboration time we have each week. There are constant conversations between elementary teachers, middle-level, high school and specialist about how students are performing academically and behaviorally. Teachers realize the power of these discussions and know they cannot do this important work alone. This work translates into positive changes for our students as we provide the correct level of instruction, at the level that is needed.

This 'student-first' attitude translates into the classroom and beyond. This love is evident for over 8 hours a day from the time students come into our doors in the morning for breakfast to the final bell at the end of the day, and extended through our extra-curricular opportunities. Teachers are making sure students are ready to start the day, welcomed with a smile and held accountable for behavior that doesn't promote the type of behavior we want them to display to their peers or adults. We review data and make adjustments to locations or specific students who need additional support. Our teachers set high expectations for their students in the classroom, but treat each student as an individual because teachers know all students learn differently and are motivated by different things. Teachers are creating an environment of respect and rapport with and amongst their students.

As we welcome the second half of the school year, this 'student-first' mentality will only get stronger as we learn more and more about each student and how to serve their needs. We look forward to providing these experiences for our students.

Scheduling 2018-19

It is an exciting time of the year as our 8th-11th grade students prepare for the 2018-19 school year. This year, our scheduling process is starting a little later than usual due to some exciting developments in the Trempealeau Valley Cooperative 2.0 and also some changes to Youth Options and Course Options (two programs used in the past to access college credit).

Course Description books were shared with students the week of February 6 and these are also now posted on our school website (www.indps.k12.wi.us) under the High School tab. That same week we surveyed our students to capture their top courses of *interest* and are using that to develop our Master Schedule.

We will begin scheduling conferences the week of February 26th starting with current juniors and working our way through to current 8th graders. These scheduling appointments are very important and we strongly encourage parents to participate in these. We not only discuss your child's new schedule, but also their career interests and next steps to get there. Juniors and Seniors have a wide variety of nontraditional class options including Trempealeau Valley Cooperative 2.0, Online, Project Circuit, and college courses. We also have options for our students to complete full technical college programs in their senior year, and industry related certifications (like CDL, First Responder, Officiating, etc.). Having parents at our student planning conference is essential to complete needed paperwork and to ensure that both parents and students understand any stipulations for such courses.

Please contact Mrs. Woychik with any questions or concerns. Every effort will be made to adjust scheduling appointments and accommodate parent needs for attendance.



The Softer Side of Math

Math can be an intimidating subject. During my high school and college career I fought hard through my math classes, often saying prayers before exams to help get me through. For me, math was about finding the right answer and using the right formula. Unfortunately, there was very little practical application or discussion to help develop reasoning and number sense skills. My math teachers knew their stuff and they were good teachers of math. However, without the time to build connections, discuss reasoning, and simply talk through the right and wrong answers, the development of my math skills were stymied.

Here in Indee, we continue to work on ways to help our students develop their confidence and ability to make sense of math. Discussions



in math class are becoming more prevalent as our teachers work to help students talk and/or write about their thinking. We also want our students to know that the hard work they do in math will likely help make them a stronger employee. In a recent article published by the National Council of Teachers of Math, several of our country's largest employers such as Google, Facebook, and Apple discussed some of the soft skills to be gained when students practice hard math:

1. Grit: To thrive, employees must be comfortable with change and push through in ambiguous or challenging environments. Similarly, by practicing math problems, students learn to persevere despite difficulty and frustration.

2. Collaboration: Employers look for employees that can execute tasks to promote their company. However, they cannot successfully do so without an understanding of the needs of their customers. Similarly, learning and doing math is not a solo endeavor. If students are struggling, they are likely not struggling alone. It should be perfectly normal to ask a teacher or friend for help, to collaborate and exchange ideas, all the while remaining humble during the process.

3. Problem-Solving: Our students will encounter problems in their careers. Developing the ability to start small, build, and then refine an answer is important. The initial approach may have been wrong, but teaching students that this is acceptable shows that they can view problems from a number of angles.

4. **Giving and Receiving Feedback:** People grow attached to their work and have difficulty seeing their own mistakes. One employer described how her company's developers always review each other's code before it goes live. This prevents bugs and loopholes. Furthermore, another developer may see an easier way to do things, which streamlines the process. As students move through practice problems, we hope to build in time for them to review each other's work, spot mistakes, or even better, find and learn a new method of solving the same problem.

It is true that hard math skills are indispensable but employers are more likely to hire a student with a well-balanced set of hard and soft skills.



Keeping Kids Safe Online, As Easy As 1-2-3!

The Internet can be a scary place for some, from the inappropriate content, not so nice comment sections, down to finding lurking predators online. Yet, for others it is viewed as a place that affords us several opportunities to increase our knowledge, socialize and to create. So keeping our children safe online can be a confusing and frustrating issue and there is not a one size fits all rule to follow. Besides, keeping them completely off the internet would be like keeping them away from using common day amenities.

So, what can we do as parents and educators to keep our children safe while using the internet? Some families have purchased routers that have added protections, or purchased subscriptions for apps on smartphones where parents can



lock their child out for a set time. Others have a more open approach and allow their child to go just about anywhere on the internet. Which is right? Well, that depends on your child's needs and their maturity level. Here are some guidelines to help you.

1. Adjust as Needed

With no two kids being alike, setting up rules that are designed for all is nearly impossible. Families all have their own values and raise their children as they see fit, therefore rules regarding the internet in one house can drastically vary to another. Different children and a different age groups of children require different amounts of oversight and guidance when using the internet and there can also be a wide degree of variation in different age groups on how responsible certain children are when it comes to using the internet. The Children's Online Privacy Protection Act (COPPA) that was established in 1998, helps to create safeguards like keeping children under the age of 13 off of social media. This act also give parents control over what personal information is shared and collected from websites and apps, but many children under age 13 have found ways to get on social media, sometime even with the parents consent. In this case, as parents and educators don't give in, help your child understand why these governing rules are in place. Building structure such as following social media age guidelines will pay off in the long run.

2. Set an Example

Our children are constant observers of what the adults around them are doing. Children are more likely to do as the adults do, then what they say to do. The old adage about actions speaking louder than words, rings true here. So, take a look at what you are doing when you are on the internet or using mobile technology. If you have set ground rules about where your child can use their devices then as the adult you need to model that expectation. It may be difficult to follow the expectation but as parents and educators we must model what we expect to get the results we want. In this digital age, take a look at your own usage of technology and perhaps you will realize that you need a diaital break too.

3. Constant Communication

Keep the lines of communication open. There are several items for purchase that can monitor where your child has been online and



will send you reports. However, as parents and educators we need to take that a step further and talk with children about where they have been online and whether or not it is appropriate for them. There are also routers you can purchase that have time limits set in them, but without establishing why there is a need for this type of monitoring and why having these restrictions matter, our efforts might be for nothing.

We need to teach our children to be good digital citizens and how to be appropriate online. Through constant communication with your child you can explain why these values are important. As a final thought, another reason to keep these lines of communication open is that, you (the parent), will be the first person they come to if the are in need of help when it comes to cyber bullying or harassment or if they happen to come across some inappropriate media.

As our children get older it is our goal as parents and educators to make sure that children won't need parental controls. By providing structure and establishing ground rules that carry over no matter where your child is an important step to keep them safe while they are online and this framework allows them to protect themselves while online.

Our students met during Advisory Time for several days to discuss our expectations and then have some fun during a whole-school assembly. Each Advisory Time group was invited to do a lip sync to a song that had some connection back to our PBIS work. The students provided some great entertainment as a fun way to emphasize the important work we do here to create a strong learning environment.


pushing and pulling the hungry hippos in order to collect wiffle balls! Good work Elementary students!!!





Robotics Competition

On January 27, 2018, two teams of middle school students competed in the very first VEX IQ robotics competition on this side of the state. The competition was held in Whitehall, WI where 18 different teams came to compete to see who would have the opportunity to move on to the state competition held at the Milwaukee School of Engineering in March. This year's challenge was to score the most points by moving rings from various places on the competition

about robotics and building their robots since mid-December. Under the mentoring of Mr. Nix they learned about programming their robots and how to build and construct a robot for this year's challenge. As they constructed their robots they kept a design notebook that best explained what they did on the different days and how they came up with their competition robot.

After their robot was constructed, the students have several opportunities to practice moving the rings and learned how to drive their robots. Several students made modifications to their robots after they discovered that certain things wouldn't work well they way they had it originally built.

On competition day, the students traveled to Whitehall with their robots to compete against 18 other teams. There are several ways you can compete at a robotics competition. There is the skills area, match play, STEM Presentation Project, and Design Notebook. Being that this was our first year our students did not have time to work on a STEM research project and our Design notebook was very basic. Our teams did compete in both the skills area and match play. During match play teams are paired up and these teams work together to score as

many points as they can. These scores are added up and at the of end the match play round teams ranked are based on the points thev scored have and then

paired up again to compete in a final match that will decide which pair of teams will qualify for the state competition. Our teams did very well for their first competition. One of our teams ended up in second place, but did not qualify for the state competition.

Overall, our teams learned a lot about what it takes to compete in a robotics competition and will be better prepared for next season. The new game challenge will be announced in April and we will work with our students to help them begin to prepare for the robotics season throughout the summer and fall.

We would like to thank the Rainbow Community Club for donating the cost of our robotics t-shirts. We received many compliments on them and appreciate that they made us look like a team!






Child Development Days and 4 Year-Old Kindergarten Registration

The Independence Public School will conduct Child Development Days on Thursday, April 5th, 2018 from 4:00-6:00 pm and Friday, April 6th, 2018 from 9:00-2:00pm. By law, school districts are required to provide screening opportunities to all children ages 2 ½ to 4 within the district. The primary purpose is to identify children with developmental delays who may be at risk for developing problems when they later attend school. Early diagnosis of delays can lead to interventions and participation in programs that can help prepare these children for their later years in school. This event will involve children 2 ½ years of age as of April 4th, 2018 to those through age 4 who do not yet attend our school. The children will be encouraged to participate in a playgroup where social, communication, motor, and early learning skills will be observed. Parents will also participate by completing a form about their child's development. Parents within the school district with children 2 ½ to 4 will be contacted and invited to have their children participate. Community agencies such as Head Start, Birth to Three, and others will be available to answer questions parents may have and to offer additional information.

Children who turn 4 on or before September 1st, 2018 should register for the 2018-2019 school year. 4 year-old kindergarten registration will be held on Wednesday, April 5th, 2018 from 4:00-6:00 pm and Friday, April 6th, 2018 from 9:00-2:00 pm during Child Development Day. If registering for 4K, please bring a copy of your child's birth certificate and the child's current immunization record.


