

From the Desk of Mr. Schmitt Coming to Common Ground



For the past eight and onehalf years, I have been in the role of an administrator after 26 years as a classroom teacher. As an administrator, a common job responsibility is to make the final decision on new proposals, policies, or procedures that are

either created by the administrator or advanced to the administrator by a stakeholder in the organization. Very seldom is everybody in the organization in unanimous support of these proposals, so an administrator has to learn very often that they will very seldom make everyone happy. Although you realize this is the reality of your role, it still isn't easy to have to decide against something someone may feel strongly about. The longer I have been in this role, the more I have realized the value of using strategies to minimize the amount or intensity of your opposition. Three strategies I have found to help me accomplish this goal are to listen, gather information, and build consensus.

In the December 2019 edition of "The Focus", which is a newsletter published by the Wisconsin Association of School Boards (WASB), the president of WASB, John Ashley is quoted as saying "By actually listening to each other, people often discover they have some common around and beliefs, and this can be helpful for future conversations and interactions." Too often, when a new idea or proposal is introduced, there is usually a negative reaction, mostly because it will change the order or structure that people have become comfortable with. I think this happened recently when the proposal to have all TVC 2.0 schools change to the trimester schedule for the 2020-21 school year was introduced. Upon initially hearing about the proposed change, many people, myself included were very reluctant, even adamantly against, the proposal. But as supporters of the proposals listened to opponents of the proposal, and vice-versa, there were some positive outcomes that all agreed upon, such as a reduction of the number of classes teachers and students had to be responsible for each day and an increase in opportunities to take more elective classes. Although the two sides still "agree to disagree" on some areas of the proposal, communication is still happening and productive compromises are occurring

It is also important to do your research before making a decision. People will be more understanding of your decision, even if they don't agree with it, if you can tell them "why" you made the decision. In my position, I spend a lot of time researching school policy, state statutes and laws, and past precedence before handing down a decision. Sometimes, I myself may not personally agree with a policy or law, but my job is to interpret and enforce policy and law as it is written and relates to the proposal or question at hand. At times I do have to interpret ambiguous policy or rule on policy that states it is based on my discretion. In these situations, reviewing past precedence, or researching similar situations can be of great benefit from the standpoint of making consistent decisions.

Finally, after doing research and listening to stakeholders, the ability to reach consensus with the people involved is important in minimizing resistance to the implementation of a new proposal. I was lucky in that my start in administration coincided with our District's decision to become a Professional Learning Community (PLC). In doing so, I had the opportunity to attend professional development about consensus building. Consensus building is not total agreement by everyone. The late Rick Dufour, co-author of "Learning By Doing", defined consensus as when all points of view have been heard and the will of the group is evident, even by those who most oppose it. Therefore, consensus does not mean unanimous agreement, but the "will of the group had been heard". The power of this definition though is that it really minimizes the amount of negative reaction to a

decision. Because everyone has had a chance to give their perspective, and the opposition actually sees they are in the minority, even though they may still not agree with the decision, they know why it was made. If done correctly, the opponents to the decision leave feeling their position is respected. It is also important to note that making a decision isn't about winning a debate or competition, it is about doing what is best for the most people in the long run.

Another strategy that I have become much better at is not making a decision quickly. I avoid the "knee jerk" reaction and use the above mentioned strategies to prevent that reaction. At this point in my career I never make a decision until I can come to a mental place I call "at peace with myself". Although I know many times I will get negative reactions to a decision I make, I know I must do what I feel is right in my heart. Sometimes it takes a long time to get to that "place", but I always know when it happens. It is also important that I show empathy towards the people I know my decision will affect. I never want a decision to be personal. It must be based on facts, policies, and past precedence. If I can do that, then I am at "peace".

In conclusion, I hope all the stakeholders of this District can use the above strategies to come to "common ground" as we approach some big decisions in the next few years. Implementing the trimester is one of them, but we have a number of other issues that will need to be dealt with. Increasing enrollment is stressing our facility, our population is as diverse as it has ever been, and the pace of information and technology is increasing at a rapid rate. With our operating referendum coming to an end after the 20-21 school year, this will definitely be a year where the stakeholders will need to come to consensus on some very important decisions. I am at peace that we will be able to do so and continue to be the "Best School Ever".

Pay Attention to Attendance: Keep Your Child On Track in Middle and High School

Showing up for school has a huge impact on a student's academic success starting in kindergarten and continuing through high school. Even as children grow older and more independent, families play a key role in making sure students get to school safely every day and understand why attendance is so important for success in school and on the job.

DID YOU KNOW?

- Students should miss no more than 9 days of school each year to stay engaged, successful and on track to graduation.
- Absences can be a sign that a student is losing interest in school, struggling with school work, dealing with a bully or facing some other potentially serious difficulty.
- By 6th grade, absenteeism is one of three signs that a student may drop out of high school.
- By 9th grade, regular and high attendance is a better predictor of graduation rates than 8th grade test scores.
- Missing 10 percent, or about 18 days, of the school year can drastically affect a student's academic success.
- · Students can be chronically absent even if they only miss a day or two every few weeks.
- · Attendance is an important life skill that will help your child graduate from college and keep a job.

WHAT YOU CAN DO

Make school attendance a priority


- Talk about the importance of showing up to school everyday, make that the expectation.
- · Help your child maintain daily routines, such as finishing homework and getting a good night's sleep.
- Try not to schedule dental and medical appointments during the school day.
- · Don't let your child stay home unless truly sick. Complaints of headaches or stomach aches may be signs of anxiety.

Help your teen stay engaged

- Find out if your child feels engaged by his classes and feels safe from bullies and
 other threats. Make sure he/she is not missing class because of behavioral issues
 and school discipline policies. If any of these are problems, work with your school.
- Stay on top of academic progress and seek help from teachers or tutors if necessary. Make sure teachers know how to contact you.
- Stay on top of your child's social contacts. Peer pressure can lead to skipping school, while students without many friends can feel isolated.
- Encourage meaningful afterschool activities, including sports and clubs.

Communicate with the school

- Know the school's attendance policy incentives and penalities
- Talk to teachers if you notice sudden changes in behavior. These could be tied to something going on at school.
- Check on your child's attendance to be sure absences are not piling up.
- Ask for help from school officials, afterschool programs, other parents or community agencies if you're having trouble getting your child to school.







Student safety is the primary consideration in making a decision relating to school delays or school closings. Normally, one of three decisions is made. The first may be a late start. In this case a two-hour school delay is our standard procedure. The second decision we may make is to close school for the day. The third decision is an early release from school, normally at 1:00pm.

We realize that parents have to make childcare arrangements for the day. Therefore, we will try to make school delay or closing decisions the night before, if possible. In the event it's not possible, we will strive to make a decision by 6:00am.

SCHOOL MESSENGER - A communication system (phone and/or email) used to deliver information to parents and/or guardians as soon as possible.
