From the Desk of Mr. Schmitt POLICY PERSPECTIVE

As the District Administrator and High School principal, my job requires me to make decisions



every day. The variety of these decisions is limitless. A few types are financial, personnel, student instruction, student discipline, public relations, and strategic planning. Many of these decisions are also very difficult, and some situations

are so unique that there is not previous precedence to look back on. I also have to be careful that I am objective and not let personal bias or assumptions enter into the decision. There is really no sure fire system to ensure that the decision you make will be the "best" one moving forward and every educational leader faces the same challenges. This is the very reason every school district has policies which are overseen by the Board of Education.

The role of the School Board, as stated on the Center for Public Education website, centerofpubliceducation.org, "is to establish policies that serve as administrators' guides for the day-to-day management of schools." If you look on our school website you will currently find over 170 Board Policies divided into nine "series" or categories. You may see a correlation to these series and the types of decisions I listed in the previous paragraph. But these are not the only "policies" that the Board creates. In addition to creating policy, the Board and administrators must also implement the policy, and constantly review it.

To implement policy, the Board either approves explicit Administrative Rules which are listed with the Board Policy, or creates Handbooks that use Board policy as their foundation. All Handbooks are approved by the Board of Education on an annual basis.

All of this information forms the basis of all decision making in the school. Policies are basically the "laws" of the school and it is my job, as well as other administrators, and to some extent

teachers, to interpret these policies. Although this should lead to consistent and fair decisions, a policy at times can be vague and ambiguous, which makes its interpretation difficult or different from another stakeholder's interpretation. It is not always as cut and dry as you want it to be. And even when it is cut and dry, it is not always pleasant to make those decisions. The alternative would be for an administrator to make decisions based on their own professional judgment. Although some may think this would work well, it would probably lead to bias, inconsistency, and ultimately chaos as the "leader" would be making the "laws" on the fly. I have learned in my 30+ years in education that you can't always make everyone happy, but when you have policy to support your decision, you at least can justify your decision.

Besides creating and implementing policy, the Board and administrators are constantly reviewing it. Some of it must be updated because of new state statutes, but more often than not, much policy is revised because it simply isn't working for the present conditions. Therefore, after each controversial, unpopular, or unprecedented decision, the policy or policies it was based upon is reviewed. After a review, the Board either decides to keep the current policy or ask the administration to revise. Usually both new and revised policies go through a first and second reading at consecutive Board meetings. This allows for public input and gives the Board time to do more research if necessary before voting on the policy.

To summarize, it is imperative that a school district have policies to manage such a complex system. Policies are the foundation and justification of decision making in the District. As a parent or community member it is important to communicate to administration and Board members if you feel a new policy is needed or a policy should be revised. Your input is always important as policies continue to be created, implemented, and reviewed.

When this year does come to a conclusion, we will analyze our student data and determine if the blueprint was followed, or if an adjustment is need-

ed before the start of next school year. We do all of this to increase the rigor of our programming which will give each student the best opportunity to succeed beyond our school walls. There is great power having a common vision across our district that we can all aspire to attain.

We need to be proud of the great work that is happening. Our students are earning higher marks in the eye of our state. At the elementary level, we are seeing a closure of our achievement gap when comparing different subgroups of students. Our elementary has been identified as a top school in the state in this area. (See Title I article on page 11.) This accomplishment is identified by the success our students have had on the state test (Forward Exam). Although we are seeing incremental success, we recognize there is still room for improvement. The arrow is pointing in the right direction and we hope to build the capacity of each grade level so the knowledge of our entire district continues to grow. That is why efforts of teaching the standards and student learning is so important at every grade level.

Summer is fast approaching and soon our children will be out of our school walls and into the walls of our community. Our children will be visiting the library, beaches, playgrounds, and even JoJo's Drive-In. To continue to help promote this growth, support our children each day you see them around the community. When you see them around town, ask them about their day. Ask them what they are reading this summer. Tell them you are proud of what you are hearing about school, and they are important to that success. Be proud of your school district! Even though we are small, we come together to do some amazing things. We would not be as successful without the support of our community. Thank you for being a positive, active community member for our children!

As parents, I hope you will take some time to



Enrichment Program Recap

Our Elementary and Middle school students have had several opportunities to expand their knowledge and hone in on skills in a variety of areas. Our 4th grade students have spent many hours researching and writing about an event, location, or person that has contributed to Wisconsin heritage. The Mississippi Valley Gifted and Talented Network sponsored the Regional Heritage Fair on April 20, 2017. Fourth Grade students from area schools put on a showcase of their Heritage Fair projects. Project topics ranged from the Peshtigo Fire to Wisconsin Dells to Cheese Curds to Wisconsin Symbols. All students were required to write and memorize a speech as well as have a visual presentation. Our students presented to three staff members, who served as judges and selected 3 projects to attend the regional fair. Those projects chosen were "Logging" by Drew Bragger, "Wood Violet" by Camilla McCormick, and "Cheesemaking" by Kendra Klimek.







These three students presented their projects to be critiqued by another judge at the Regional Fair and also listened to presentations on one woman's sole trip of kayaking the Mississippi River as an Adventure Artist and they learned about Maple Syrup making with B & E Trees from Cashton, WI. The students had a great day listening to others present their projects and learning about Wisconsin History.

To finish out the year, we will have students participating in Battle of the Books and Kids College. In the Battle of the Books event, students read 30 books over the course of the year and will compete against other area teams. They will be asked to remember details from the books and give the title and author to correctly answer each question. Points are awarded and the team with the most wins will be deemed Battle of the Books champion.

11 of our 5th grade students will travel to UW-La Crosse to experience what it is like to go to college. Kids College allows area students to participate in classes just like they would if they were a student on campus. This experience gives our students the idea of what it is like to be a college student and to show them that if they work hard going to college is something they can attain.

TO: Families of Independence Students Grades 6-12

We would like to acknowledge students for taking exceptional care of the laptops again this year. The District leases these devices from Apple, and in the summer District Technology Staff will be going over the laptops to make upgrades to software and your laptop will be reimaged. As a result students will be "checking" the laptops back in prior to the end of the school year. Below is a summary of the process.

All students in grade 6-11 will be returning their laptop to school for Summer Check In on June 1, 2017. Seniors will be checking in their device on May 25, 2017.

Prior to May 25, 2017 (for Seniors), all students should make sure any files saved to Documents or on the Desktop are moved to Google Drive and that you have Synced Google Drive. Anything not saved to Google Drive will be erased when we reimage the laptop. Please see Mrs. Pientok or if you need assistance with moving your files.

On May 25, 2017 and June 1, 2017, each laptop will be collected and checked in by the student to Mrs. Pientok. Students will be called from class by grade level to bring their laptop, case and charger to the Cafetorium or other designated area. This allows the tech staff to look over the laptop and accessories to determine if there is any damage and/or if the student will be charged a fee associated with any damage that is found.

Damage resulting from negligence will be a charge of up to \$100 for the first incident as stated in the Responsible Use Policy. Students should be reporting any damages on their laptop as soon as they occur, so that our staff can determine if the damage is a result of negligence and determine whether or not a fee will be assessed.

When students check in their laptop, they will need the following:

- Macbook Air
- Case
- Macbook Charger, Extension Cord and Duck Head

If the student does not return the Apple approved charger at the time of check in, they will have until the end of the last day of school to check it in or will they be charged in full for the Macbook charger. **Cost of charger is** \$80.00.

Students, if you are using a charger that is not Apple approved you are at risk at causing damages to your laptop. Any damage that may occur as a result of using a charger that is not Apple approved will be determined as negligence and you will be charged a fee based on our tiered incident charges; 1st incident \$100, 2nd-\$200, 3rd-full cost of repair or full cost to replace device.

During the check in time the Technology staff will be looking for the following things:

- Dents and Dropped Damage
- Missing or Damaged Keys
- Trackpad Issues
- Cracked screen, Pixel Issues
- Case Condition
- Functionality of Device

Any damage that is found on the laptop that results in the laptop not working to optimal functionality and is the result of negligence will be assessed a fee. All fees will need to be paid prior to the start of the 2017-2018 school year or your child will not be able to pick up their laptop at Family Learning Day.

Some examples of damages that have occurred and the cost associated to fix the device include:

- Crack Screen: Replace screen cost \$500
- Dead Pixels: Replace screen cost \$500
- Missing Keys: \$15- \$150
- Damage to Charging Cord: \$80

We would like to thank you again for your support with the laptop 1:1 initiative and for your efforts in keeping the laptops in good care. We look forward to a smooth check in process that will allow us to keep these laptops in the best possible shape for future educational use. 

Earth Day 2017

Reality Check 2017

The Buffalo County UW-Extension Office invited the Independence juniors and seniors to the 11th annual Reality Check event. During this event students examine their choices and consequences of decisions related to: education, careers, earning, budgeting, borrowing, credit, alcohol, and substance use, and childcare.

Before the event, a representative from the UW-Extension Office came to our school to complete an orientation for the students. Students were required to complete research ahead of time regarding a career of their choice and the starting wage they would be earning at the age of 25. During Reality Check, students were 'given' this wage and a description of their life (married, divorced; number of children). Students were required to visit a total of 30 different stations to make financial decisions. Some of these stations included housing, credit, human services, insurance, veteran's benefits, auto, investments, a "Fate" station and many more.



The first activity for the day was to go through a simulated employment interview us-

ina an application completed by each student. At their next station volunteers helped them undertheir stand paycheck including taxes and other withholdings. The next stop was the bank. Stu-



dents were given a checking account with blank checks and a register to keep track of their spending. Next, students were given the freedom to visit any station they wanted, but before they completed the simulation for the day they were required to visit all the stations. At the last station, students worked with an adult volunteer to review their checking account. If they had money left they discussed what could be done with the money on a monthly basis such as saving or investing. If they had a negative balance for the month, they had to go back to some of the stations and adjust their spending habits.

At the end of the day, students were tired and a bit overwhelmed; but the general consensus was that there was a wealth of information to learn and it was a successful event. There were over 130 local volunteers from various businesses and agencies that helped with the day. A special 'Thank You' to Rainbow Community Club for helping with volunteers and a monetary donation, and also Independence State Bank for the donation of checkbook supplies. There were approximately 300 high school juniors and seniors from surrounding schools that participated in the event. We look forward to Reality Check 2018!


